Michael Neer '63



I'm **Michael Neer**, a 1963 graduate of West High School.

While attending seventh through twelfth grades at our Alma Mater, I experienced both happy and sad times, like many others. During ninth grade, my dad died. My brother had entered the military, so it was just Mom and me. Thank God I had a loving extended family (aunts, uncles, and cousins most of whom are also West High graduates). It was a sad time but looking back it worked for my good

contributing to the man I was to become.

I was looking for a father figure when in stepped chemistry teacher Mr. E. T. Stone, a knowledgeable and kind encourager who became my mentor. I had dreamed of becoming a rocket scientist from the time I was a little boy and he helped me develop a passion for the science behind it. Many other teachers at West High contributed to my future in a variety of subject areas but most of all helping me develop the discipline and study habits that made me well prepared for college.

Summary of my Professional Life

In February 1972, OSU awarded me a Ph.D. in Aeronautical and Astronautical Engineering preparing me for a fifty-year career (so far) as a defense contractor, working in various positions, always as part of like-minded teams of scientists and engineers.

From 1972-1975, I was a Visiting Scientist at the Air Force Aerospace Research Laboratories at Wright Patterson AFB doing basic research in air-breathing hypersonic propulsion (SCRAM Jets) which is still a hot area I'm working today.

From 1975-1979, I was Assistance Director of Aerophysics at Aeronautical Research Associates of Princeton (N.J) where I conducted research in a variety of technology areas supporting national defense.

In 1979, one of my professors from Ohio State and I formed SciTec Inc., in Princeton, NJ, where I took my technology to the field helping to test defensive military systems and getting them ready for production.

Finally in 1995, I created my own business, Neer, Inc. contracting with various U.S. government agencies, again involving defensive military systems. I've traveled a lot and get to play with many very expensive "toys." Despite my age and health conditions, I just signed up for another five years. My government sponsors keep me around as much for my enthusiasm and sense of humor as my experience.

Personal Life

I am married to a very caring woman, Alice. We live in the North Georgia Mountains on a heavily wooded ten-acre lot with a lake, mountain view and lots of wild animals. Our lake is well stocked, but I prefer to buy fish from the supermarket already cleaned, filleted and ready to cook.

I have seven wonderful children, six boys and one girl, all healthy and doing well. They are all four years apart in age (30 consecutive years with a kid in college). I finally figured out it took me three years to forget how hard it is to have a new baby in the house. Whatever mistakes I may have made raising my children, I have since corrected when raising my trumpet plants.

Even though I attended church as a child, I didn't accept Christ until age 46. Most important to me is leading a Men's Saturday Morning Breakfast at my Church. I've done this fifty weeks a year for the last twelve years. We have a manly breakfast followed by a discussion on the practical aspects of being Christian men. Between 20 and 45 men attend each week. They remind me that my ministry isn't about me. We share, we laugh and sometimes, we shed a few tears. I've put the Men's Breakfast Group on Facebook. Surprisingly, nineteen people have joined who live out of state even though they don't attend the breakfasts. They whine about the long drive.

By the Grace of God, I have been able to work with amazingly talented people and contribute to the development of numerous defensive weapon systems. While I currently have four serious health conditions, I'm thankful they haven't prevented me from doing my job. I still work fifty hours a week and plan to do so until I either die or my sponsors put me out to pasture.

I appreciate the West High School Alumni for honoring my life and career by inducting me into the Hall of Fame. Thank you and God bless

Roger Street, January 1960



Roger Street was born in Columbus in May 1942. He grew up on the west side, attending John Burroughs Elementary School and West Junior-Senior High. He was an active participant and role model in a variety of activities during high school, culminating in his role as president of the January Class of 1960. Roger served on student council, Hi-Y, the "Fun Without Destruction" program, was selected to attend the Rotary Luncheon, and was a West High Ambassador (a program in which class officers

and student council officers visited other high schools in the city to gain knowledge and exchange ideas with students in similar positions). He also played basketball all 6 years (junior and senior high) and was voted "Best Athlete" by his classmates during his senior year. Roger was a proud West graduate and his connection to the school continued as an active member of the Alumni Association's Scholarship Committee, advocating for West High School students pursuing higher education.

After graduating from West, Roger earned his Bachelor's Degree in Education from Capital University in 1964 and then graduated from The Ohio State University with a Master's Degree in 1967. He began his lifelong dedication to the field of education at Medina Middle School, where he taught history and social

studies. He also continued his love of sports by coaching the school's basketball team. During this period, he became a guidance counselor, giving him the chance to become a mentor to many young people, who surely benefited from his knowledge and advice. He also found time to officiate high school basketball games.

His ability to connect with people, combined with his steady support, advocacy, and passion for the power of education led to a career with the Columbus City Schools where he was a teacher, guidance counselor, supervisor, and mentor to many. His positive impact was felt across his variety of roles – from supervising guidance staff and vocational coordinators

to overseeing college fairs and administering the GED and ACT/SAT testing. He also felt immense satisfaction in the years he spent as an admissions counselor at Columbus State Community College, after retiring from Columbus Schools. His professional legacy was solidified in the initial leadership he provided in the founding of "I Know I Can", a local program with the mission to inspire, enable, and support Columbus City Schools' students in pursuing and completing a college education.

Roger was a member of the National Association of College Admissions Counselors, the Ohio Association of College Admissions Counselors, the Ohio Association for Adults and Continuing Education, and the Ohio Vocational Association.

Roger was recognized with numerous honors throughout his career, including the Distinguished Service Award from The Ohio State University Office of Minority Affairs, the Pupil Services Administrator of the Year Award from the Ohio Counselors Association, and the Basketball Official Meritorious Service Award from the Ohio High School Athletic Association.

Anyone who interacted with Roger experienced his dry wit, personable nature, and wonderful sense of humor no more so than his wife of 54 years, **Bonnie McEntire Street**, a fellow West High School graduate, Class of 1958. While Roger was in his happy place sitting with a fishing pole, his greatest joy came from spending time with Bonnie and his children, Craig and daughter-in-law Kristin; Carrie; Chad and daughter-in-law Stephanie; and five grandchildren, Colin, Courtney, Carter, Claire Anne, and Cailynn.

Bill Kern, Class of January 1960, nominated Roger.



Meet the Honorees



Stephen Garland 1970



I was born in 1952, the second of three children of William and Betty Garland. I grew up at 345 Clarendon Avenue in a quiet, working-class neighborhood in the Hilltop with well-kept houses, trimmed lawns, and an abundance of children playing touch football on the side streets and pick-up basketball games in the alleys behind our houses. My father was in the business of buying and selling industrial machinery and represented the fourth

generation of entrepreneurs in our family. My mom was

a housewife until her three children had graduated from high school, and then taught kindergarten until she retired in 2008.

I started kindergarten at Highland Elementary School at the age of four, followed by attending John Burroughs Elementary School through the sixth grade. I went to Hilltonia Junior High School from seventh through ninth grades and completed my tenth through twelfth grade years at West High School. While at West, I participated in track, football, and basketball. I won the District Long Jump during my junior and senior years.

After graduating from West High School in 1970, I attended Waldorf Junior College in Forest City, Iowa. While there, I was selected All Conference Wide Receiver in football. I was also selected as the Academic Athlete of the Year, receiving the most letters and best grades, while participating in football, basketball, and track. After receiving my Associates Degree in Business and Accounting from Waldorf, I continued my education at Augustana College in Sioux Falls, South Dakota graduating with a Bachelor's Degree in Business Administration in 1974.

Upon graduation from Augustana, I began working for IBM Corporation in their data processing division, marketing large systems to retail organizations in Columbus such as Sears, Federated Department Stores, and Big Bear Incorporated. In 1977 I left IBM and joined our family business, Garland Enterprises, and began to sell industrial machinery internationally. I founded Garland Caribbean Corporation, an organization that bought and sold sugar mill equipment and ran dredging operations throughout the Caribbean. In 1982, I became CEO of Niger Steel and supervised the reconstruction of their Steel Rolling Mill located in Enugu Anambra State. Over the next four years, I worked on a flourmill construction site in Benue State and numerous road projects in Southern Nigeria until a series of coups forced my departure from Nigeria. Upon my return home, I founded The Great Lakes Machinery Corporation, which operated for the next twenty years in the business of selling industrial machinery throughout the Great Lakes, Canada, and Mexico.

During that period of time, I was also involved with the Amachi Program of Big Brothers/Big Sisters Organization, which mentored children of incarcerated parents. In addition, I coached Special Olympics basketball for the Columbus City Schools during nineteen of those years.

In 2008, the pastor of my church (Grace Apostolic Church), the Rev. James Gaiters, asked me to begin programming at the Ernest L. Hardy Center. It was a building the church owned that had been underutilized. The mission of the center was to provide inner-city youth and their parents with the tools they need to become more viable within society. We started programming there in 2009 with 23 kids in the summer program that, over the years, has increased to 400 children throughout the 50-day summer program. Also, there are 150 kids involved in an afterschool program, which runs from October to April. During the past two years of the pandemic, we have delivered over 200,000 meals to children in the neighborhood who could not attend the summer camp. Our mission at the Hardy Center is to prepare young minds for a prosperous future through literacy, life skills, and leadership. I pray to God that in some small way we are doing that. At any rate, I have given-up all hope of retirement.

In closing, I would like to acknowledge a few people. First, my grandfather, J.L. Garland, who was the wisest man I ever knew. Second, Carl Fulton, my mentor and little league football coach, who always had confidence in me and never gave-up on me. And thirdly, my high school track coach, Bill Huckaba, who is the kindest man I have ever known.

In the Columbus area, Stephen Garland was a 2013 Jefferson Award Winner. This is an annual award honoring the contributions of individuals who fulfill a need for service and help solve community problems. His work at the Hardy Center certainly justifies this remarkable award.

Richard Curtiss, 1958



Richard "Dick" Curtiss was born August 23, 1940 at Mt. Carmel West Hospital in Columbus, Ohio. His education was through the Columbus Public Schools, graduating in 1958 from West High School. While at West, Dick participated in marching band until the time he was asked to announce a football game one Friday evening. Little did he know, that this event would shape a lifelong career as a high school sports announcer! He also participated in cross-country, track, and basketball for the

West High Cowboys. Dick was involved with demolay and played basketball for his chapter while in high school and as a young adult. He played on several intramural basketball and softball teams throughout high school, even winning a few championships.

After graduating from West, Dick attended The Ohio State University. He graduated from OSU in 1962 with a Bachelor of Science in Education. While a student, he was involved with a religious fraternity, Sigma Theta Epsilon, and held the office of president. With his Education Degree, Dick began teaching elementary school in Columbus Public Schools. During this time, he was selected to attend Clark Atlanta University, as part of the NDEA (National Defense Education Act). He was pursuing his

Master's Degree in school guidance counseling and this University was a HBCU (historically Black college/university) school where white students could enroll in a historically Black college. During his time in Atlanta, he met his wife, Brenda. They married on August 21, 1966 and returned to Columbus. He completed his school guidance program through The Ohio State University, graduating in 1966 with a Master's Degree in School Counseling.

South-Western City Schools employed Dick as a guidance counselor for over 30 years. Most of his time was spent at Westland High School, as he was part of the original 1970 opening staff at the school. He announced all the Friday night home football games as well as the basketball games and he became well known as the "Voice of the Cougars". He retired from his position in 1993, but his "Voice of the Cougars" continued well over 40 years at Westland. The National Honor Society Chapter at Westland is named in his honor, as is the Press Box. When he was not at Westland, Dick managed to find time to work as a manager at the community swimming pool, LIVCO.

After retirement, Dick began working with Prodigy Student Travel. He became a licensed official Washington, D.C. tour guide taking many middle and high school groups on trips to our nation's capital. He truly loved working with young adults and his passion was helping and supporting students through their transition into adulthood. He was a caring individual and treated everyone with kindness, regardless of background. This was evident from everyone who knew him. Not only did he stay connected with the students that he loved and nurtured, he also continued to shape educators for the future with both his advisement and monetary donations. In addition, he continued to serve on the OSU Educational Alumni Board. Although very busy, he continued to also give back to the West High School community. He was a scholarship committee reader, donated to the scholarship fund, and attended general meetings and activities of the West High School Alumni Association, such as the annual West High School Golf Scramble.

Dick was also involved in the far west Columbus community activities. He sat on many Boards, including the Southwest Public Library Board for 17 years and the Advisory Board for Doctors West Hospital. Dick was a lifelong resident of the west side and was very active in the Lincoln Village Resident Association. He created the first-ever community garage sale, "Flea Fantasia for Lincoln Village". He was the Master of Ceremonies for the Lincoln Village Fourth of July celebrations as well as helped with planning the annual event. Dick was also the recipient of the prestigious Southwestern City Schools Bell Award. This award is given to teachers who go above and beyond their duties. They can be nominated by staff, parents, or students.


What is Riverblindness?

Bruce Benton '60 was inducted into the West High Hall of Fame (Humanitarian) in 2001 for his 20-year leadership in eliminating Riverblindness (Onchocerciasis) throughout Africa. He recently published a book about the disease and the elimination effort, in *Riverblindness in Africa: Taming the Lion's Stare* (Johns Hopkins University Press, December 2020).

Bruce describes the disease: "A blackfly transmits a microscopic parasite that develops into a worm 2 ½ feet long that lives in the body for 14 years. That worm produces millions of microscopic worms that fill up the body. These tiny worms cause incessant, horrific itching as they squirm underneath the skin – sometimes causing suicide – and they migrate into the eyes resulting in permanent blindness. The book presents the discovery of the disease and the effort to control it in Africa. That effort was launched in 1974 by Robert McNamara, then-president of the World Bank."

Bruce led two international programs—the Onchocerciasis Control Program and the African Program for Onchocerciasis Control—to eliminate the disease. They covered 31 African countries where 98.6% of the world's cases of the disease occur.

Bruce raised the financing for the effort – \$750 million from donors around the world. He also mobilized unique partnerships combining UN agencies; donors; ngos; the pharmaceutical company, Merck; African governments; and the affected communities themselves, to eliminate the disease. One important tool has been an oral medication called ivermectin, which kills the microscopic worms that cause itching and blindness. Bruce emphasizes that ivermectin is extremely effective and safe against parasitic infections – but not against viral infections, such as Covid-19. "All responsible, quality studies show that ivermectin is largely ineffective, and can be dangerous, when used against Covid-19."



Bruce is confident that lessons learned from the Riverblindness program experience, that are outlined in the book, can have a beneficial impact on approaches to disease control. He states: "Lessons learned can be applied to a range of global health programs. For example, we understood the importance of multi-country collaboration, and a regional approach focusing on intercountry, intersectoral partnership was adopted at the beginning. Unfortunately, we failed to do this with COVID-19 and have paid a heavy price, particularly in the United States. Many other important lessons from the Riverblindness effort can guide programs to eliminate the other major neglected tropical diseases that devastate the poorest of the poor around the world."



About the Author

Riverblindness in Africa: Taming the Lion's Stare represents the culmination of a 50-year career for Bruce Benton – a career focused on humanitarian and development assistance for sub-Saharan Africa. Nearly half of that career has been devoted to expanding the program to eliminate riverblindness or onchocerciasis, a disease which has devastated much of rural Africa for generations. The World Bank recognized his leadership in managing that program with a Special Presidential Award in 2000.

Bruce's career was launched by a two-year stint in the Peace Corps, teaching English and physical education to middle and high school students, in Guinea in the mid-1960s. Following the Peace Corps, he earned Master's degrees from Johns Hopkins University (School of Advanced International Studies) in African studies, and the University of Michigan in development economics. During the 1970s, he served in the Office of the Secretary of the US Treasury, as deputy director of the Departments of Raw Materials and Oceans Policy and Multilateral Development Banks. While at Treasury, he was awarded a Congressional Fellowship, which led to advising members of the US Congress in the House and Senate on foreign assistance legislation for developing countries for 2 ½ years. By the early 1980s, he had become convinced that he could most effectively pursue his goal of enhancing the impact of development assistance for Africa by working at the World Bank, which he joined in 1982. Following his retirement from the Bank, Bruce taught global health as an adjunct assistant professor at Georgetown University.

Bruce and his wife, Patricia, moved to Orcas Island, Washington in Puget Sound, northwest of Seattle in 2020. Previously, they lived in Bethesda, Maryland, where they raised four children.


