

# Rest in Peace Nancy Wilson by Nancy Lloyd Laver '79

**Nancy Sue Wilson** passed away peacefully at her home after a long illness on December 13, 2018. She was 81 years old and an alumnus from the class of 1954. She had been living in Pioneertown, CA about 35 miles north of Palm Springs, California. She is survived by her son Kacy Dennis; daughters Sheryl Burton and Samantha Burton; grandchildren Lane, Sol, Shane, Chase, and Savannah; sisters Karen Davis of Lancaster and Brenda Vann of San Diego. Many consider her a shining star from West High School. She was nominated and received the Hall of Fame award in 2005. This edition of the newsletter is dedicated to Nancy Wilson.

After 60 years in the business, Nancy Wilson performed her last scheduled concert on Sept. 10, 2011, at the Ohio University campus in Athens, Ohio. "If I'm not going to be doing it anymore, then what better place to end it than where I started – in Ohio," said Ms. Wilson. Two of our alumni, **Billie Marzluf Williams** and **Scheila Albery Sanderson**, both from the class of 1955 made the trip that day to see Nancy in concert.

Billie shared her thoughts about that night: "It was a wonderful evening. We attended a reception and then the performance. Ms. Wilson was the ultimate performer and the show was full of her hits. At the end of the show, Nancy said "be happy for me, this will be the first time in many years that I will turn the calendar page and tomorrow will be blank."

Scheila remembered the evening: "Nancy Wilson was introduced by Dr. Jean Smith as a success story from the Columbus City Schools, West High School. Nancy sat on a tall stool and began to sing in that beautiful voice.

She gave credit to Edythe White, who was the choir director at West High School, for helping her get started. In school, Nancy was in choir and in various singing groups. I remembered her from tax stamp shows\* and band variety shows. That night she sang many of the beautiful songs from our era, the 50's, like "Sentimental Journey" written by Les Brown. It was indeed a night of sentimental journey for us to see her in her last concert. Such a classy lady."

Thank you, Nancy, for many years of entertainment.

\* Tax stamps were little paper stamps that were issued when you paid tax on items. It was a government program to collect sales tax. At school there was a tax stamp club and they would put on a talent show and asked students to bring in more stamps. Schools could then turn them in to the state to collect 3% of the face value.

# Nancy Wilson '54

Professional singer, actress, and Grammy Award winner Nancy Wilson blurs the lines between jazz singer and pop singer, preferring to be called a song stylist. A uniquely gifted song stylist able to interpret jazz, soul and pop, Nancy stands among the greatest performers of the past fifty years.

Born in Chillicothe, Ohio, in 1937, Nancy displayed incredible talent as a singer from a young age. At 15 she won a talent show in Columbus - the prize was her own

West's pre-engineering program is at the heart of its STEM designation. Currently, about 150 freshmen enroll in a Computer-Aided Design (CAD) class in addition to their regular academic classes. CAD is comparable to the drafting classes of previous generations-only utilizing the precision and power of a computer to conduct the actual drawing. Students learn the rudiments of design and are exposed to both architecture and mechanical engineering. Those who opt to remain with the program for their sophomore year learn how to combine basic electrical and mechanical devices into building simple machines like automated levers or pulleys. Juniors separate into two strands-architecture/ civil engineering and mechanical/electrical engineering-for more advanced work. Seniors design and complete a capstone project to complete their high school learning. For all three upperclass years, the pre-engineering classes are in addition to a student's regular college preparatory curriculum. Seniors also become part of the Rube Goldberg Competition team, whose goal is to design and build a contraption that achieves a simple objective by combining multiple, seemingly-unrelated tasks in an imaginative and amusing fashion. West student teams have captured both a regional (multi-state) championship and runners-up honors during the last four years in this annual contest.

Students who complete the program are prepared for entry into the workforce in a skilled position or for further education. Some have matriculated directly to The Ohio State University for engineering or related fields; many more take their first two years at Columbus State Community College to earn an Associate's Degree in engineering studies and then proceed to the Ohio State Main Campus. In any case, this program is enabling our community's young people, many of whom come from less than advantageous circumstances, to access opportunities they never were aware of prior to high school.

At a recent membership dinner meeting, West Dean of Students and a co-founder of the STEM program, Jon Siemer, shared with our group an overview of the program and the impact it has made on participating West students. The program has attracted students from all over the city—and even some suburbs, too—to choose to attend West because of this academic specialty. As a West alumnus, I am particularly proud that our school has developed an *academic* program that is gaining recognition for its excellence.

twice-a-week television show, Skyline Melodies. After graduating from West High School in 1954, Nancy was a vocalist with Rusty Bryant's band and other bands at local clubs. Upon hearing her at one of the local clubs, Cannonball Adderley was so impressed that he told her to look him up if she ever came to New York. That chance meeting led to her being signed to Capital Records. In 1962 a jazz album recorded with Adderley thrust Nancy into the public consciousness.

After countless television guest appearances, NBC gave Nancy her own network series, The Nancy Wilson Show, for which she won an Emmy award for the 1967-68 season. She also performed on The Andy Williams Show, The Carol Burnett Show, The Flip Wilson Show, and had acting roles on TV series such as I Spy, Room 222, Hawaii Five-O, Police Story, The Cosby Show, and lately, Moesha and The Parkers.

Nancy was Capital's second biggest selling act (behind the Beatles) and a regular on the pop, soul and jazz charts. In 1980 Nancy moved to Columbia Records, and began a second career featuring the new Urban Adult Contemporary format. As the 90 s came to a close,

# West High Today - Wilson Singers

This is an interview with the current Director of Choirs, **Douglas Brunner.** Mr. Brunner had a Christmas concert which featured the Wilson Singers.

### What was the inspiration behind the group name?

The inspiration behind the West High Wilson Singers' name came out of school pride. We wanted to honor the rich musical traditions of West while looking forward to the future and the improvement of the program. Nancy Wilson set an amazing standard and we wanted to see that as motivation and respect to the school and an alumnus who is remembered and beloved by so many. Especially, due to her passing, we feel it is even more important that we honor her and her contributions.



Nancy decided to spend more time with family, and she slowed down both her touring and recording. One of her more interesting albums came about in 1991 when pop singer Barry Manilow was given a sheath full of lyrics written by the late Johnny Mercer that the great songwriter never put to music. Manilow added melodies and chose Nancy to sing the resultant songs. She left Columbia and signed with the small non-profit label MCG Jazz for which she recorded a 2001 Christmas album.

After more than 50 years and five-dozen albums, Nancy would create one of the greatest albums of her career on a small custom label. This album **R.S.V.P. (Rare Songs, Very Personal)** won the Grammy Award for Best Jazz Vocal Album. In 2004 she celebrated her 50th year in show business with a Jazz Master award bestowed by the National Endowment for the Arts.

Nancy also keeps busy as host of NBC's Walk a Mile in My Shoes, a look into the 90-year history of the NAACP. Recently, she was inducted into the Walk of Fame for her continuous work in the field of civil rights. She has received many other awards during her career including the coveted Emmy and Grammy. Nancy has always exhibited the highest of standards and unparalleled grace. She has distinguished herself nationally and internationally as one of the great song stylists of the world. And she did it with real class.

Nancy Wilson was nominated by her classmate, **Anita DeMatteo Lantz**, 1954 June.

# Was this name for just this concert, this year, or for many years to come?

We plan on using this name for the rest of the year and are very likely to keep the name moving forward. We would like to continue to honor but at the same time create ways of honoring the Hilltop community and the school we are a part of.

# Did you sing any of Nancy Wilson's songs at the concert? If so, which ones?

We have not sung any Nancy Wilson songs yet - but we plan on it!

### Did you sing jazz songs? Pop songs?

We are continuing to expand our horizons in hopes of singing more and more music that is not familiar to the West High Choir Family. Singing jazz is a goal of ours.

# What is the date of your next concert?

Our next concert will be Monday, March 7th @ 7pm. FREE to the public. We will be singing songs from every decade - 1960s through today! # Do You Remember the 1969 Rose Bowl Trip? by Nancy Lloyd Laver '79

When I was in the West High School marching band as a sophomore in the fall of 1976 there were so many stories about **Mr. Jim Hill**, 1949 and the legendary trip to Pasadena, California for the Rose Bowl parade. As an underclassman, I was in awe of that band and the stories that were told. In recognition of that infamous trip, which happened fifty years ago, I was able to interview a few former students who were in that band: **Tom Shook**, 1970 baritone horn squad leader and **Kim N. King**, 1971 trumpet player.

### What was it like preparing for the Rose Bowl trip?

There was a lot of parade practice through Westgate and laps around the track. Most practices were held before school except for a few weekends on an unopened track of 270 between Roberts Road and Cemetery Road. These were done so we had a wide berth like Colorado Boulevard in Pasadena. We parked on the entrance ramps.

### What was it like practicing in the late fall and winter?

We had plastic mouthpieces and an antifreeze solution for our valves. We had at least one 270 practice in a pretty good snow storm. We REALLY bundled up for those practices with long johns, heavy duty boots and lots of gloves. After one of those practices we had a difficult time getting our cars off the on ramps through the snow.

### Did you have any special fundraisers at that time?

Tom recalled selling "stock" in the "**Billion Dollar Band**", which was a great promotional gimmick. We also had a marching exhibition fundraiser at State Fair Coliseum with the help of some other High School Bands. We also played at the Statehouse and for grand openings for various businesses. (BBF on campus for sure) Of course, we always sold the World's Finest Candy Bars.

### What memories do you have of Mr. Hill?

Mr. Hill was a task master and big-time motivational speech guy. Most notable quote "Whatever the mind can conceive and believe, it can achieve". He loved his classic Cadillac and his saddle bag Harley. He would often arrive at practice after we had already started morning practices with the Drum Majors and assistant directors with a roar of the Harley.

According to Kim, Mr. Hill cooked up the **ZIPPY** movement of clean-cut American youth. Zealous in Promoting Patriotic Youth. The band was charter members of this movement in selling the band for fundraising. There were 100 band members and 32 Weskets that made the trip. **Jim Patterson**, 1971 was the drum major that year.

### What was the trip like?

According to Tom, it was super cool to have charter buses take us to the airport and have our own chartered plane. We visited Disneyland, Knotts Berry Farm, and the Rose Bowl game. A couple things always come to mind that were out of the ordinary; practicing on the LA airport runway; the baggage handlers and other airport and hotel workers razzed us about how USC and OJ Simpson were going to beat Ohio State badly in the Rose Bowl game. USC lost and OSU won the National Championship.

For many students, this was their first time going on an airplane, staying in a hotel, and leaving the state of Ohio. Kim also remembers being really tired from jet lag and eating Chinese food at a buffet for the first time. While at Disneyland and Knotts Berry Farm we marched through both parks.

Kim remembers Pasadena being around 80 degrees F that day and the Rose Bowl parade was over 5  $\frac{1}{2}$  miles long and the students had tickets to go to the Rose Bowl game, but most of the students were too tired and too dehydrated to go to the game.

Tom remembers the following year in 1970 the band was slated to go to the Sugar Bowl in New Orleans. The students were not permitted to march in the parade as it was forbidden by the Columbus Public Schools School Board. We watched the parade, toured New Orleans, rode a riverboat, attended a party for the bands, and did interviews for Papers and Television about our not being allowed to play. This trip led to Mr. Hill's dismissal at the end of the year.

# West High School Today Congratulations Cowboys! PBIS Gold Award Winner!

PBIS stands for Positive Behavioral Interventions and Support. PBIS is a framework that is mandated under local, state and federal guidelines/law. An important piece of PBIS is identifying 3 - 5 behavioral expectations. At West, our behavioral expectations are based on our motto: Be Safe, Be Respectful, Be Responsible, and Bring your Best to West Every Day! The tiers of PBIS focus on positive climate and culture within the school. Tier I includes interventions that are provided to ALL students, for example our Cowboy Bucks and Cowboy Bucks Store Program. Tier II includes interventions that are provided to students who are not responding to the level I interventions. Examples include our Mentoring programs and group work (Pregnancy/Parenting Group, Anger Management Group, Grief and Loss Group). Interventions in Level III are provided to those students who are struggling the most and have not responded to the Tier I and Tier II interventions. An example is our Intervention Assistance Team meetings. These IAT meetings include the child, parent, teachers, administrator, school counselor and school social worker. In each of these meetings, we first acknowledge the strengths in each child, then identify areas of assistance needed and finally, we develop a plan for improvement.

Each year the State of Ohio recognizes schools for implementing PBIS with fidelity in each of the 3 tiers of intervention. The Gold

Award is the highest level of distinction. West High School is the only Columbus City High School that has received this distinction. We were presented with the Gold Award at the State PBIS Conference in Columbus in December 2018. The Award is currently hanging in the main office and a banner highlighting this distinction is on the wall across from the Library. Congratulations Cowboys!

# In Remembrance of Tom Ongaro '54

If you're lucky, you cross paths with someone who makes a difference. Who knew that mine would be **Thomas Clayton Ongaro**.

I met Tommy while we were working with Lois Hunter Neff '55, Patti Culp Ongaro '54, Cindy Steinke, John Duncan '69, my husband John Ward '67 and others to form the Hilltop Historical Society. Our first project was a Civil War Encampment at St Mary Magdalene baseball diamonds where he acted as a "tour guide". He continued this role for many years leading groups from the Hilltop Bean Dinner to Camp Chase Cemetery or meeting school children or tour buses directly at the cemetery. He sure loved to talk history! My husband would do historic programs at the statehouse and Tommy would accompany him as his "wingman".

For more years than I can remember the Ongaros, Andersons and Wards would go to monthly Sunday Brunch. Through the years my various 2 daughters and then 5 grandchildren would occasionally take turns going with us. They loved "Tommy" stories and invited him to school activities, birthday parties and shared their lives with him. He was a surrogate grandpa to them. He was always sharing stories of his grandchildren Stephanie and Steven, brother Frankie and the accordion, the Ongaro Garden Centre, and his athletic adventures.

Tommy was an athlete. He played several sports and played on championship football teams in the community, junior high and senior

high. During his senior year at West, he was named to the 1953 Dispatch All City League Squad as a Back. He was proud of his talent and the community that came out to support the team. The stadium was full of supporters back in those days.

He played for a year at Ohio State as a backup running back for Howard "Hopalong" Cassidy before going into the Navy. I wish I had a dollar for

every time he told the story about his 100-yard kick. He said that it went 50 yards straight up in the air and 50 yards straight down. Woody Hayes didn't want him to kick after that. Wow...was his laugh ever infectious! I retired from OSU and got football season tickets for many years. Most seasons he went to at least one game with either my husband, myself, or one of the grandchildren. He always needed to stop in the clubhouse to visit Greg Lushutka or Archie Griffin. Tom knew everyone!

After he tells those funny stories, which he has hundreds of, I can envision Patti elbowing him and telling him to behave. **Patti Culp** moved from Worthington her senior year and Tom was immediately smitten when he saw her. He graduated in January 1954 and she graduated in the June 1954 class. He absolutely loved to tease his Patti. Many remember the night **Nancy Wilson**, 1954 was inducted into the Hall of Fame and Tom got up and sang to Nancy. I cracked up laughing so hard. Patti was mortified. This became a fun topic at brunch and always resulted in an elbow from Patti.

He was a dedicated friend who visited former classmates, customers, and neighbors in hospitals and nursing homes. Did you need your lawn mowed? Snow shoveled? A ride to the doctor? That's why it was natural to provide meals and services for him the last year he was in his home. He did so much for others....so unselfishly.

He was nicknamed Mr. Hilltop by people in the community. He liked to walk as he ran errands. One of his friends persuaded him to use his artistic talents to paint artwork on the windows of Big Bear. He talked to the manager and got permission to paint a representation of life on the Hilltop as an attempt to draw in more customers. His artwork drew a lot of publicity and the windows are rumored to be stored somewhere. He sure did his part to save Big Bear.

I think his greatest community accomplishment was the 2010 restoration of the West Broad St railroad bridge by Great Western. He grew up on Letchworth and later moved to Demorest Road, so he walked under that bridge a lot. He had been contacting mayors, Conrail and the railroad commission for the better part of 30 years. When he noticed cracks in the steel beams, not just concrete, he feared there was a great potential for loss of life, so he contacted the Camp Chase Railroad. They were able to find stimulus money of \$373,286 and make the repairs. There's no doubt in my mind that someday there would have been a tragedy if this had not been repaired. My hero got a standing ovation at brunch for this one!

There is so much I miss about my friend. His corny jokes, spontaneous singing, love of everything Westside and OSU. His overwhelming patriotism when he wore his Navy hat and sweatshirt while fondly recalling his Korean War days. His art gallery in his garage and his beautiful yard and gardens. But most of all I miss him because he made a difference...my memories that I've been privileged to share.

**Tom Ongaro** passed away on December 18, 2018 and he was from the class of 1954.

# A Life Cut Short by Nancy Lloyd Laver '79

Amadi Bakari, class of 2017, died on December 29, 2018. He was shot and killed. I do not know the circumstances of his death, but it is sad knowing that his life was cut short. Amadi volunteered with the Alumni Association concession stand for two years during both the football and the basketball seasons. He lived in the Wedgewood Apartments south of Sullivant Avenue at Wedgewood Drive. He was the oldest of six children. Nancy Smith, June class of 1950, worked with Amadi in the concession stand and remembers how he would walk her out to her car when it was time to go home. She said, "he was such a nice kid and was always very polite". Dorance Hornsby, class of 1963, took Amadi home after he volunteered at the concession stand. When he got out of the car "he always told me to be careful going home and to tell my husband hello." Coach Felix Catheline worked with Amadi as his wrestling coach. Amadi was a Columbus City Champion at the 103 lb. weight in wrestling. I asked Coach Cat about Amadi and he said "He was like a son to me. I am sad his life ended the way it did, and I pray his murderer comes to justice."


**Journal**. A week or two later, I quit my route and tried out for the West High School wrestling team. I was a natural! I'd been wrestling with my Appalachian cousins since I could crawl.

Mr. Butler taught me the moves; especially, how to stay off my back! I finished second in the city that year. I taught a few cocky seniors from several high schools not to underestimate a boy from the Hilltop.

Larry Gray, our assistant wrestling coach, told me a story about John Paul Butler. He told me that Mr. Butler was an All-American football player at **Capital University**, - guard, if I recall. He said that Mr. Butler would blast across the line on the very first play of every game, knock his opponent onto his backside, and quietly say to his foe, "Let's mix it up. I like it rough." I'm certain that opponent spent the entire game working at not getting mauled by Mr. Butler.

Above all, Mr. Butler was a gentleman. He coached me how to wrestle honestly, ethically, and to never backdown. And, I never did. Mr. Butler taught me to show respect for my opponent and to never humiliate him – just beat him fair and square and make him dread the next time he had to wrestle me again.

John Paul Butler was dignified, ethical, stalwart, soft spoken, and compassionate. Mr. Butler taught me how to be tournament champion, City champion, and District champion. I loved that man. Blessings to all in his family. You come from fine stock!




# 25th Anniversary of Band Trip to Rose Bowl

Saturday, January 1, 1994, marked the 25<sup>th</sup> Anniversary of the West High School Marching Band's trip to the Rose Bowl and Tournament of Roses Parade in 1968.

The Band and Wesket Drill Team received an invitation to march in the parade in Pasadena, California in June 1968, and immediately undertook a campaign to raise the \$42,000 needed for the trip. West High's Marching Band became Columbus' first high school representative to a post-season bowl game, and was one of only 20 high school bands in the nation to participate in the Rose Bowl Parade.

Director James Hill made sure the bandsmen and drill team were in top physical condition to march the parade. Daily practices included two miles on the school track, calesthenics, and jogging.


In a statistic sheet prepared by the band parents, it was noted that there would be 110 band members and 40 Weskets (drill team), plus 24 chaperones. The band was all brass plus percussion, and marching uniforms were West Point style with buff and brown coats, white cross bars, white pants, brown shoes, white spats and gloves, and West Point style white plumes on the hats. The uniform jackets had 21 buttons on the front, 20 on the tails, nine on each sleeve, and four on the neck – for a total of 63. Wesket uniforms were long-sleeved all silver sequins with red and blue in a V-stripe on the front. Wesmarched in a parade at Disneyland, and were joined by the Ohio State University Marching Band in the parade down Main Street. On Tuesday, the group visited Knott's Berry Farm, then attended a New Year's Eve pep rally that also included OSU bandsmen, faculty, and friends at the International Hotel, official student headquarters. The big day was Wednesday, January 1, with the Rose Bowl Parade down Colorado Boulevard.

Thursday, January 2, the band returned to Columbus, and it was back to school. All agreed it was truly "A Time to Remember", the theme of that 80<sup>th</sup> Rose Bowl Parade. We thank Jack Davies, who was Band Parents President in 1968-69, for sharing his scrapbook and information with Alumni of West High School.

kets members carried strips of material that formed an American flag when unrolled, and marched this way in parades.

Band instruments were chrome-plated, making West's band the only chrome-plated band in the United States at the time. Chrome plating outlasts others, does not interfere with sound, and is easy to clean, requiring only dry cloth polishing.

The band left Columbus on Sunday, December 29 in their traveling uniforms of the gold turtle neck sweaters and brown skirts or pants for the men. A West High School Band emblem topped each uniform. On Monday the 30<sup>th</sup>, they
