

I graduated from West High in

1967. Because Westmoor Junior High School was so crowded in

the '60's, I had to have 7th grade

at West High. Our class was there

the infamous tunnel that was built under the railroad on Huron Ave. so the kids didn't have to walk all the way around to Hague Ave. to get to school. The tunnel was eventually filled in because too many not-so-pleasant things seemed to happen with kids inside the tunnel.

My most influential teacher while at West was Mr. Jim Hill '47, our band director. Since I did not participate in any other clubs, all my friends were in the marching and concert bands and the orchestra. I do not know if he was my favorite teacher, but he truly introduced me to many genres of music which to this day are still a big part of my life. I played saxophone in elementary and junior high because that was the only instrument, we had at home which was my dad's. Not wanting to buy another instrument, I was told that was my only choice if I wanted to play anything at all. Of course, that all changed when I got to West. Since Mr. Hill had changed the band to all brass, to rival OSU's band which Mr. Hill was a part of, I had to learn a brass instrument. My sophomore and junior years I played trumpet, but Mr. Hill switched me to baritone my senior year because he needed more baritone players. I was none too happy about that move. I also was switched to

a bassoon (which he said was very much like the sax) so that I could be in the orchestra. My saxophone days were over, but for all of it, I learned how to play many instruments that I would not have even considered had Mr. Hill not made me switch. I met Steve while in the band while I was a sophomore, and he was a senior. My parents were very active in the Band Parents Organization while both my brother, Kim Hardy '73, and I were in the band, so that was probably



another reason that I spent my high school days in the instrumental music program instead of other groups at high school.

I went on to The Ohio State University getting a BS and MA degrees in elementary education. I began teaching in 1970 in Muldraugh, Kentucky after Steve and I were married and he was stationed at Ft. Knox, Kentucky with the Army. I retired from Columbus City Schools after 36 and 1/2 years of teaching, but still teach part time now as a reading tutor. I am completing my 50th year of teaching this school year and will continue doing this until the school system "kicks" me out or my old bones tell me I need to be done. Teaching truly keeps me learning new things which helps my brain stay active and sharp.

Steve and I have two children. Our son **Andy Stone** graduated from West in 1994 and was also a member of the band but played football as well. That would never have been allowed with Mr. Hill. He got his BS degree from OSU in civil engineering and an MA in engineering from Ohio University. He is also a member of the Ohio National Guard and just last year was promoted to Colonel and is now serving his third deployment in the Middle East. He lives with his wife Tanyah and their two sons, AJ age 15 and Walker age 12

in Nelsonville, Ohio on our family farm. His civilian job is that of City Services Director for the city of Athens, Ohio.

Our daughter Erin Stone McLaughlin graduated from West in 1999 and played trumpet in the concert band but did not

- The notion that you will not agree or have the same opinion on everything that you encounter over the years. You have to develop the ability to look at each other's views, acknowledge them and try to come to an agreement or compromise, so that you don't carry a grudge, burden or anger towards your spouse that lasts so long it "sours" your relationship.

- Timing is important when bringing up or discussing problems. I remember the year Steve had been deployed with the National Guard during the Xenia tornado. He had been gone a week and our tax statement had come while he was gone. That was what I told him about immediately after he arrived home and my timing should have been better than that. Needless to say, that was not the first thing he wanted to hear about when he wearily came home drained emotionally and physically from his mission even though for me it seemed like the most important thing to talk about.

- Be realistic about your expectations for your marriage. Both of you will change over the years you are together and so will your love over the "long haul!" It will still be strong and present, but not necessarily like it was or felt like when you first decided to get married. As Steve said, teamwork is how you build your relationship through doing schooling, jobs, finding a home and raising children and then having to change again once the kids do not need raising anymore. Your marriage must change with life's circumstances, but the strength you built from your love through it all will remain.

As part of our anniversary celebration, we had a big trip planned to fly to England and stay a week to take in the sights and then cruise back on the Queen Mary 2 coming into New York Harbor where all our kids were going to meet us. COVID did that vacation in, so whenever things get back to normal, hopefully we will still be "young enough" to take it!

Steve Stone's Story

I graduated in 1965 when the boys in my class, for the most part, went to the draft board and war or off to college. Since I had a goal of becoming an Army officer and teacher it was off to college and ROTC for me. Activities during my high school years centered around membership in the concert band, marching band, where I served as the drum major, playing alto saxophone in dance band and clarinet in the orchestra.

As in almost everything I did, I was not the best nor the worst, rather being quite happy to be somewhere in the middle. Our son, **Andrew Stone**, who also graduated from West High School at the top of his class in 1994, referred to me once as "the gray man."

Of course, my favorite classes were music, where I spent countless happy hours in the school's band room basement. It was there that I met my wife of 50 years, **Jan Hardy**. Perhaps of more significance toward my later life was Biology I & II taught by Mary Baker and Clarence Bowers, respectively. There was an old, abandoned green house in a courtyard just off Miss Baker's classroom where she allowed and encouraged me to spend countless hours growing tropical plants and raising goldfish. During my freshman year at Ohio State University, Miss Baker stopped by my parents' house and asked them if I could accompany her and work for her in the nature department at a boys' summer camp in Maine.

One floor above her classroom was the advanced biology class of Mr. Bowers. He always wore a bow tie and was a quiet, gentle man with the habit of ending his sentences with an odd little "Umm" at the end. I have never forgotten his lessons on parasites that could infest the human body. For the remainder of my life, I have worried about eating pork due to it prevalence for being infested with the trichinosis parasite. And I have never forgotten the one time he shared an example of starving soldiers getting parasites from eating grass – while on the Bataan Death March during World War II. For everything else he was before or since, to me, I will always remember that I sat in the presence of a Bataan Death March survivor.

As for alumni involvement, mine has been limited to attending class reunions all of which I have enjoyed and found quite interesting. During the year of our 50th reunion I returned to the alumni marching band for a final strut down the field just to prove I could still do it. It hurt the next day.

I graduated with a Bachelor's and Master's degree in education and administration and also received an Army commission. After three years of active duty service I returned to Columbus where I taught school and served as a school principal. During this same time, I pursued a military career in the Ohio Army National Guard and Army Reserve, retiring as a Colonel. I have been retired from the military since 1994 and Columbus Schools since 1999.

Since then I have managed our family's more than 100 yearold farm in Athens County where I have pursued a career in timber management, horse boarding and riding along with a variety of conservation projects to include serving on the supervisory board of the Athens Soil and Water District and was selected as the state's top tree farm in 2011. I have also written and published a family farm history book along with conservation and history articles for local and state magazines. Jan and I have two children, Erin, and Andrew, both of whom also graduated from West High. We find it incredibly special that our daughter, Erin, who graduated in 1999, sat in the same choir room as her grandmother (my mother) Autumn Keefer Stone, a 1936 graduate.Each of our children is married and each has two boys. Erin served six years in the Ohio Air National Guard while Andrew is a Colonel in

the Ohio Army National Guard serving his third combat tour in the Middle East. He is a civil engineer while Erin has a degree in education.

The secret of a long marriage is to stay married, and before you know it you will find yourself a historical celebrity. It is kind of fun going out to dinner and having the server say, "Wow! You have been married THAT long?!! How cool is that!" In the United States very few people remain married – to the same person – for that long. They either get divorced or die. It is strange how once you approach the 50-year mark; you suddenly start to be glad you remained married to the same person. But up to that point it is not an easy road. It takes a lot of tolerance, compromise, and forgiveness. It is not love like you see in the movies or on TV, but rather the kind of love you feel working as a team to provide a secure home base, an anchor, a safe harbor, for your children and grandchildren.

It is seeing the family as something greater than yourself. It's about doing your duty and building the family history.

What year did you graduate from West?

My parents were not happy so I told them I would "suck up" to her a bit and amazingly the next 6 weeks I got an A even though my typing skills did not change all that much. I ended up with a **B** in her class. Other than **P.O.D**. with Miss Harrison I had a blast my senior year. I absolutely hated her class & just "squeaked" by with a low C. I was lucky to get that!! She was not a fun teacher to have.

What were some of your favorite classes? Why?

Band / Marching Band and Dance Band were the top ones. The members of these were kind of our own clique and many of us hung out together and/or dated each other. The only other class I enjoyed was Senior English with Mr. Waugh. He was a fun teacher and made the class interesting for all of us.

Who were some of your favorite teachers?

Mr. Hill '47 - or **Jimmy Lee** as many of us called him. He put on a tough exterior during marching season which he had to do BUT once you really got to "know" Mr. Hill he was genuinely a great friend to me and many others!!!! Mr. Waugh - Again he was a really "great" teacher who made English class enjoyable for all of us. He also knew how to "relate" to us kids!!! I had English 7th period. One day Stan Broadway & I were late coming back from lunch at Biddle's. We wrote a note to Mr. Waugh that said: Please "excuse" Joe and Stan for being late as I, Jim Hill, am not here to sign this note. Mr. Waugh looked at the note - paused for a moment then smiled, shook his head, and told us to take our seat!!!

What are you involved in with the Alumni Association? Past and present involvement?

I did not get involved in the Alumni Association till about 10 years ago. We had always passed over the Florida Luncheon for many years figuring it was for the older folks. Connie and I finally decided to attend a luncheon and we regretted not doing it years sooner!!!!!! When we arrived at the Bradenton Country Club we ran into Ed & Lois Sensenbrenner'50 as we were walking across the parking lot. Then about 4 years later Nancy Hardy Smith '50 and Baileen Gary Dodd '48 said they needed someone younger to take over the luncheon as they were getting up in age and then they looked at me. I said I would do it and commandeered Tom Ramage '67 to help me as he had been coming for a couple years by then too. We have had a ball doing them these past few years although unfortunately the crowd keeps dwindling down due to age. We keep trying to get more folks from the 60's to attend but it is difficult. People who graduated in the 40's and 50's kind of stuck together versus ones from the 60's and beyond who are scattered all over the place.

What is your motivation for being involved with the Alumni Association?

The fun of getting together down here once a year for the annual luncheon and everyone having a really "great" time!!!

What would you like members to know about you personally and your family?

We moved down to Spring Hill just over 40 years ago and had a new house built on the end of a cul-de-sac on two lakes. We are still in the same house after all these years. My daughter was born just after we moved and is a native Floridian!! The main reason we moved down here was not the snow part so much but the overcast and gloomy days on end up north in the winter. When we moved to Spring Hill there was not a traffic

We have two kids. My daughter Sarena is a middle school teacher in Tampa. She has been doing it for 16 years now. Sarena loves her job even though she is underpaid for what she must put up with in the school system anymore. She just got married last year to George who is a great guy. My son Chris is an electrician, and he lives locally.

Any other ideas?

During my senior year, parking as we all know was a bit tight on the Palmetto St.

side of the school so I started parking on the basketball court area when we would come back from lunch end of 6th period. One day I was called into "Uncle Dave's" office to have a chat with him.

He said very simply in his "stern" **Mr. Randall** voice "Don't park there again or I will have your car towed." I thanked him and moved it immediately! Several years later when Connie and I had rental properties we got a call from **Debbie Randall** '68 and her husband Tom wanting to rent one of the properties we had on North Terrace Ave. When they came to look at it good old Uncle Dave came with them. We discussed the rent and I told Debbie that I was going to give her a break on it for two reasons -

She had told him what the heck she didn't have anything going on that night so she would go out with him just to get out of the house if he would pick up some shampoo for her at the store on his way over to get her. After we had talked and just as they were getting ready to leave Doug's house, she got angry when Danny commented to her that everything was great. He had his car, his girl, and his stereo!!! She said she told him she

was "not" his girl and to take her home!!

That is how I got "lucky" enough to get a date with my future wife. The first time we went out I picked Connie up, said hi to her parents & we left, and I was "hooked" on her. The second time we went out I came by to pick her up and still had my white shirt and tie on from working at Albers Grocery. Her father called her into the kitchen and when she came back out, she asked me for my wallet. I thought that was "odd" but gave it to her anyway. She went back in the kitchen for a minute or two and then came back out, gave me my wallet back and said let's go with a grin on her face. When we got out in the car, I asked her what that was all about, and she said her dad had asked her what the heck she was doing going out with this "older" guy!!! Once she showed him my driver's license, he could not believe I was only a little over a year older than she was so all was ok then. We dated 3 years and as soon as I turned 21, we got married and have been together now for over 53 years!!!

In 2001, we let our membership know we would accept any yearbooks they wanted to donate. The first yearbooks we received were used to build a Yearbook Library. Through the generous donation of many alumni, we were able to build a collection of one yearbook for every West graduation year starting with 1912 through 2018 - except 1913, 1917, and 1994.

Our Yearbook Library is a great resource for our newsletter editor to verify grad-

uation years, find articles and pictures for the Alumni Newsletter, and look for information we often get questions for from alumni and alumni families. Since 2001 we have sold over 400 yearbooks. That is almost \$12,000 of proceeds that have been deposited in our Alumni Scholarship Foundation Fund.

The Columbus Public Library has been working on a project for over a year to scan all of our yearbooks into their permanent records. Eventually they will make these available to view online on the Library website. Once they complete scanning the yearbooks they plan to scan the West Occident newspapers we have and the large composite graduation pictures that have been donated to the Alumni Association.

The Alumni Association currently has over 300 yearbooks for sale. We never remove a name from our Wait List unless asked to. When we cannot contact someone, we keep him or her on the list and move to the next person listed.

The Alumni Association sent out a call for proposals to create a new website for our organization.


